RELU – Key Public Challenges

- Restoring trust in food chains
- Tackling animal disease in a socially acceptable manner
- Sustaining agriculture in a liberalised economy
- Promoting robust rural economies
- Mitigating threats from climate change and invasive species
- Reducing stress on water catchments

And to:


"Expand capabilities for interdisciplinary research on rural issues."
