# Relu news



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- 1 Defra support for RELU research on management of animal diseases

Animal disease is hitting the headlines once more and Defra has provided an additional £240,000 to support the work of four RELU research projects on the management of animal diseases. That supplements the £3 million allocated by ESRC, BBSRC and NERC for these projects. The aim of the extra funding is to enable additional research and analysis to be carried out directly addressing Defra's agenda and to support a dedicated programme of knowledge exchange between the RELU projects and Defra officials and stakeholders. Two projects are particularly topical. The Governance of Livestock Disease is considering a range of cattle diseases, how policy on one disease affects the others, how different organisational levels interact and the consequences for the overall health of animals. Strategies around containment are another controversial issue in outbreaks, particularly when different research disciplines do not always share ideas or approaches and the science community is not always good at translating knowledge into policy advice. Assessment of Knowledge Sources in Animal Disease Control is bringing together expertise in a very wide range of disciplines to focus on building integrated strategies in three major areas: foot and mouth disease, avian flu and waterborne diseases.

# 2 RELU provides international bridgehead for local food development

Frances Rowe, head of rural development at ONE North East linked up with North American researchers at a RELU event which compared international experience on food chain localisation. # 3 RELU research feeds into policy thinking on flooding

RELU research is making a contribution to many areas of policy making, including such hot topics as flooding. The Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Committee has decided that it will hold an inquiry, inviting evidence from interested parties and the RELU project *The Integrated Management of Floodplains* has sent in a submission. A Government review on flooding "Making space for water" has already highlighted research by the *Sustainable Uplands* project. Director of RELU Philip Lowe said: "It's most encouraging to see the RELU projects taking the initiative and feeding research evidence into the policy-making process. That's exactly what the programme should be doing."
